In addition, works by Robert C. Tucker and David M. Potter have been translated into other languages: some of David M. Potter's writings, and Robert C. Tucker's works, have been translated into Russian as well as many Western European languages, and into Chinese, Japanese, and Korean. For example, David Potter's *People of Plenty* (1954) has been translated into Japanese, under the title of *Amerika-no Tomi to Kokuminsei* [「アメリカの富と国民性」] (1957), and into Korean, under the title of *Kukminsŏng-kwa Kyŏngje Paljŏn: Miguk-ŭi P'ung'yo-wa Kukminsŏng Yŏnku* [「國民性斗 經濟發展: 美國의 豊饒斗 國民性 研究」] (1969). Robert C. Tucker's *Stalin as Revolutionary, 1879–1929* has been translated into Chinese (Simplified), under the title of *Zuòwéi gé mìng zhě de Sīdàlín (1879-1929)* [作为 革命者的斯大林(1879-1929)]
